

INTRODUCTION

The 2018 edition of *Governments Canada* offers thousands of direct contact details for every level of government in Canada. This publication offers the most cohesive and current information in order to make it easier for our clients to find their contacts.



This 11th edition of the book includes significant provincial and territorial updates, including the recent general elections in British Columbia, Nova Scotia and Nunavut; by-elections in Manitoba, Newfoundland & Labrador, Ontario, Québec and the federal government; and cabinet shuffles in Manitoba, New Brunswick, Newfoundland & Labrador, Ontario, PEI, Québec, Saskatchewan and the federal government. Information on ongoing changes in the Senate is also included.

The municipal section includes results of recent elections in Alberta, Newfoundland & Labrador and Québec.

This edition also includes updated information on diplomatic representatives, including the latest major diplomatic appointments.

Quick Reference Guide

The Quick Reference Guide is a detailed list of references to topics of interest (for example, "Acts & Regulations," "Human Rights," "Vital Statistics"), under which the applicable contact branch, division, office or department is listed by name, with full address, phone, fax and email details. This is designed to be a one-stop reference for the user who wants a quick contact for a broad range of subjects.

The Listings

Federal government listings are followed by provincial and territorial government listings in alphabetical order. The sections are tabbed to provide easy visual access. Each section contains a table of contents including page references for major departments, ministries, agencies, boards and commissions within that government. The listings begin with the vice-regal representative, the office of the government leader (Prime Minister, Premier, Leader), the Executive Council (or Cabinet), with administrative staff and committees. The Legislative or National Assembly or the House of Assembly follow, including the Clerk, Speaker, Sergeant-at-Arms, Hansard, Legislative Librarian, Government Caucus Office and Office of the Official Opposition and of other parties.

Details on the Legislature follow, with date of the last general election, current party standings, and member salaries, indemnities and allowances. Included are

listings for MPs, MPPs, MLAs, MNAs, etc., with constituency, party affiliation, phone, fax and email (where this data is available). Members are listed alphabetically by Member's last name.

Government departments follow and are listed alphabetically by keyword, along with large stand-alone agencies (e.g., Canada Post Corporation). Smaller associated agencies, boards and commissions are included in the listing for the particular ministry or department to which they are attached (e.g., the New Brunswick Agricultural Insurance Commission appears as an associated agency in the listing for New Brunswick Department of Agriculture, Aquaculture & Fisheries). Listings include full address, phone, fax, email, URL, social media, and other communications numbers (toll free, TTY, etc.), where that information is available. A list of Acts Administered by the department or ministry is also included. Branches, Divisions, and Regional Offices are presented hierarchically within the department, clearly identified, and include key contact people with name, title, phone, fax and email, where available.

Following the provincial listings is the municipal section, which is arranged by provinces and by municipal type (i.e. Major Municipalities, Counties & Municipal Districts). These listings include municipal contact details, population figures, dates of incorporation and much more. Key executives, like mayors, councillors and administrators, are also included.

The diplomatic section is arranged into two sub-chapters: foreign embassies in Canada, and Canadian embassies abroad. Key contacts, like ambassadors, high commissioners and counsellors, are included.

Indexes

- Acronym Index shows an alphabetical list of commonly used acronyms for departments, ministries, agencies, boards and commissions.
- Contact Index is over 300 pages of more than 25,000 key contacts included in the book, listed alphabetically by last name and including title, department, branch, division, phone, email and website. Multiple page numbers are given for contacts who appear in more than one place in the book.

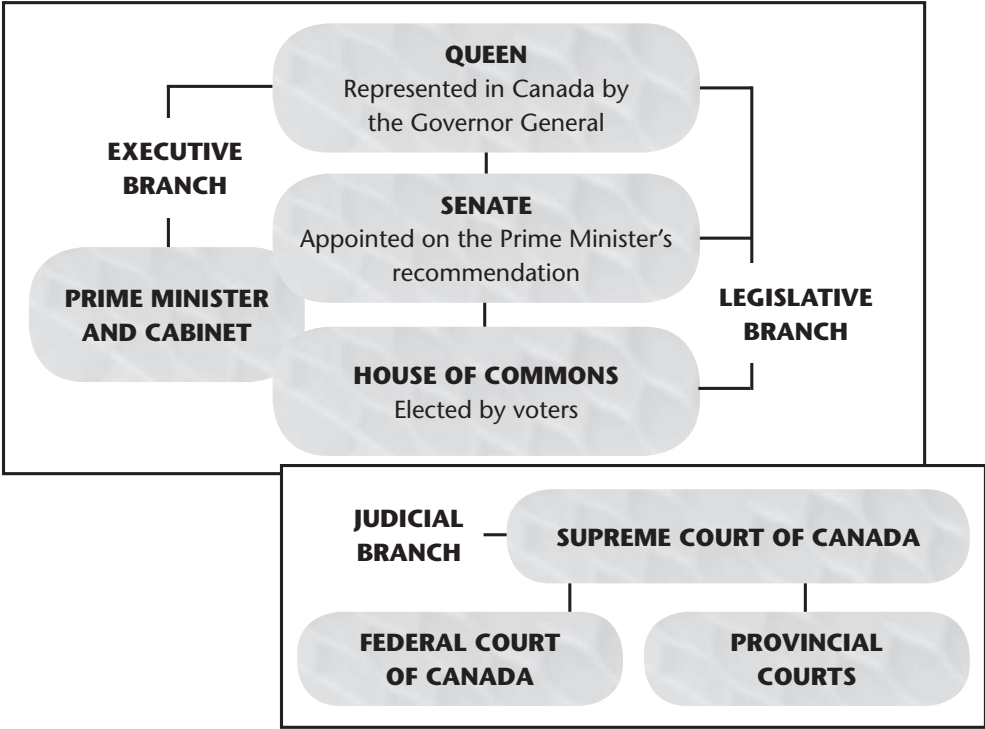
THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT



Our system of government is part of the reason why Canada is known around the world as a good place to live. Canada’s parliamentary system is open and democratic. It offers the opportunity for people to give their input and it is designed to make sure proposals for laws are carefully considered.

Canada’s Parliament consists of three parts: the Queen, the Senate and the House of Commons. They work together to make the laws for our country. The executive branch consists of the Queen, the Prime Minister and Cabinet, and the departments of government. They implement the laws. The legislative branch makes the laws, and the judicial branch – which is not part of Parliament – interprets them.

Longest-serving sitting MP: Louis Plamondon (BQ, Bécancour–Nicolet–Saurel, first elected in 1984)
 Eldest sitting MP: David Allan Tilson (CPC, Dufferin–Caledon, 76, first elected in 2004 at age 63)
 Youngest sitting MP: Pierre Luc-Dussault (NDP, Sherbrooke, first elected in 2011 at age 19, setting a record for youngest MP of all time)
 Manon Parreault was suspended from the NDP caucus in June 2014. She then sat as an Independent.
 Sana Hassainia quit the NDP caucus in Aug. 2014. She then sat as an Independent.
 André Bellavance quit the BQ in Aug. 2014. He then sat as an Independent.
 Rob Merrifield (CPC) resigned his seat in Yellowhead, AB, in Sept. 2014.
 The Forces et Démocratie (FD) party was created in Oct. 2014, and has two sitting members: former BQ MP Jean-François Fortin, and former NDP MP Jean-François Larose, who both quit their original parties in 2014. The FD did not win any seats in the 2015 election.
 By-elections were held on Nov. 17, 2014, with CPC candidates winning in both cases -- Pat Perkins (Whitby-Oshawa) and Jim Eglinski (Yellowhead).
 Liberal MPs Massimo Pacetti and Scott Andrews were forced to sit as Independents in Nov. 2014, and officially ousted from the Liberal caucus in March 2015.
 Glenn Thibeault (NDP) resigned his seat in Sudbury in Dec. 2014.
 Eve Adams crossed the floor from CPC to Liberal in Feb. 2015.
 John Baird (CPC) resigned his seat in Ottawa West-Nepean in March 2015.
 James Lunney left the CPC caucus in March 2015 to sit as an Independent.
 In the 2015 general election, a new record was set for number of women elected, with 88 female MPs being elected in 2015, compared with 77 in 2011.
 A new record for elected aboriginal MPs was also set, with 10 elected in 2015 compared with 7 in 2011.
 Jim Hilmyer (CPC) died on March 23, 2016.
 Inuit MP Hunter Tootoo (Lib.) resigned from cabinet and the Liberal caucus on May 31, 2016. He remained as an Independent.
 Mauril Bélanger (Lib.) died on Aug. 16, 2016.
 Stephen Harper (CPC) resigned his seat on Aug. 26, 2016.
 Jason Kenney (CPC) resigned his seat on Sept. 23, 2016.
 A by-election in the riding of Medicine Hat--Cardston--Warner, Alberta, was held on Oct. 24, 2016. Glen Motz (CPC) won the seat.
 Denis Lebel (CPC) resigned his seat on June 19, 2017.
 Rona Ambrose (CPC) resigned her seat on July 4, 2017.
 Gerry Ritz (CPC) resigned his seat on Aug. 31, 2017.
 Darshan Kang resigned from the Lib. Caucus on Aug. 31, 2017.
 Judy Foote (Lib.) resigned her seat in Sept. 2017.
 Arnold Chan (Lib.) died on Sept. 14, 2017.
 Dianne Watts (CPC) resigned her seat on Sept. 25, 2017.
 By-elections were held on Oct. 23, 2017, with Lib. candidate Richard Hébert and CPC candidate Dane Lloyd winning their respective ridings.

HIGHLIGHTS OF SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

Below is an up-to-the-minute list of the most recent changes to higher level government contacts in the federal, provincial, territorial and municipal governments, as well as important events related to government that have taken place since our last publication. Please see the in-depth listings in this book for full details of departmental and personnel changes.

Municipal

Newfoundland & Labrador held municipal elections on September 26, 2017. In St. John's, Danny Breen – who had been the Councillor for Ward 1 for eight years – was elected Mayor.

Alberta held municipal elections on October 16, 2017. In Calgary, Naheed Nenshi was re-elected for his third term as Mayor. In Edmonton, Don Iveson was re-elected for a second term.

Québec held municipal elections on November 5, 2017. In Montréal, former Mayor Denis Coderre lost to Valérie Plante, who became the city's first female Mayor. In Québec City, Régis Labeaume was re-elected for a fourth term.

Diplomatic

On August 21, 2017, a number of diplomatic appointments were announced. They were:

- Susan Bincoletto became Ambassador to the Swiss Confederation, replacing Jennifer MacIntyre.
- Louise Blais became Ambassador and Deputy Permanent Representative to the United Nations in New York City, with special responsibility for Agenda 2030 and Development.
- Nicholas Brousseau became Ambassador to the Republic of Kazakhstan, with concurrent accreditation as Ambassador to the Republic of Tajikistan. He replaced Shawn Steil.
- Alexandra Bugailiskis became Ambassador to the Italian Republic, as well as Permanent Representative to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the World Food Programme and the International Fund for Agricultural Development, with concurrent accreditation as Ambassador to the Republic of San Marino. She replaced Peter McGovern.
- Lilian Chatterjee became High Commissioner in the Co-operative Republic of Guyana and Representative to the Caribbean Community, replacing Pierre Giroux.
- René Cremonese became Ambassador to the Republic of Zimbabwe, replacing Kumar Gupta.
- Jeff David became Consul General in Chongqing (People's Republic of China), replacing Philippe Rheault.
- Stephen de Boer became Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the World Trade Organization, in Geneva, replacing Jonathan Fried.
- Jess Dutton became Ambassador to the Arab Republic of Egypt, replacing Troy Lulashnyk.
- André Frenette became Ambassador to the Republic of Haiti, replacing Paula Caldwell St-Onge.
- Shauna Hemingway became Ambassador to the Dominican Republic, replacing Steve Côté.
- Heidi Hulan became Ambassador to the Republic of Austria and Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the International Organizations in Vienna, with concurrent accreditation as Ambassador to the Slovak Republic. She replaced Mark Bailey.
- Emmanuelle Lamoureux became Ambassador to the Lebanese Republic, replacing Michelle Cameron.
- Marcel Lebleu became Ambassador to the Republic of Colombia, replacing Don Bobiash.
- Patricia McCullagh became Ambassador to the People's Democratic Republic of Algeria, replacing Isabelle Roy.
- David McKinnon became High Commissioner in the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, with concurrent accreditation as Ambassador to the Republic of Maldives, replacing Shelley Whiting.
- Kyle Nunas became Consul General in Ho Chi Minh City (Socialist Republic of Vietnam), replacing Richard Bale.

- Nathalie O'Neil became High Commissioner in the Republic of Cameroon, replacing René Cremonese.
- Patricia Peña became Ambassador to the Republic of Chile, replacing Marcel Lebleu.
- Laurie Peters became High Commissioner in Jamaica, replacing Sylvain Fabi.
- Benoit Préfontaine became High Commissioner in the People's Republic of Bangladesh, replacing Benoit-Pierre Laramée.
- François Rivest became Ambassador to the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan, replacing Kenneth Neufeld.
- Julie Shouldice became Ambassador to the Republic of Côte d'Ivoire, replacing Patricia McCullagh.
- Nicolas Simard became Ambassador to the Democratic Republic of the Congo, replacing Ginette Martin.
- David Sproule became Ambassador to Mongolia, replacing Ed Jager.
- Caterina Ventura became High Commissioner in Brunei Darussalam, replacing Marina Laker.
- Louis Verret became Ambassador to the Republic of Mali, replacing Marc-André Fredette.

On September 29, 2017, Prime Minister Trudeau announced that Québec businesswoman Isabelle Hudon would be Canada's next Ambassador to France.

Federal

Senators James Cowan, Nancy Ruth and Wilfred Moore retired in January 2017, after reaching the mandatory retirement age of 75.

On January 18, 2017, former Chief Government Whip Andrew Leslie was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Foreign Affairs.

On February 1, 2017, Senator John D. Wallace stepped down, as he promised when he was first appointed in 2009. He retired over seven years prior to reaching the mandatory retirement age of 75.

Privy Council member James Aloysius McGrath died on February 28, 2017.

Privy Council member William Rompkey died on March 21, 2017.

Senator Pana Merchant retired on March 31, 2017, a year before reaching the mandatory retirement age of 75.

On April 6, 2017, Judy Foote announced she would be stepping away from her role as Minister of Public Services and Procurement temporarily, to deal with family matters. Minister of Natural Resources Jim Carr assumed her duties on an interim basis. On August 24, 2017, Foote announced she would be permanently resigning from cabinet, and from federal politics in September, leaving her seat in Bonavista—Burin—Trinity, Newfoundland and Labrador, vacant.

Privy Council member Ronald George Atkey died on May 9, 2017.

Also on May 9, 2017, Senator Don Meredith resigned after the Senate ethics committee recommended he be expelled for his relationship with a teenage girl.

On May 15, 2017, Interim Conservative Party Leader Rona Ambrose announced she would be stepping down and resigning from the House of Commons to take a position at the Washington-based Wilson Center, joining its Canada Institute as a visiting Global Fellow on Canada-U.S. trade issues. The riding of Sturgeon River—Parkland, Alberta, was left vacant by her departure.

Andrew Scheer was subsequently elected Conservative Leader at a convention held the weekend of May 27, 2017.

On June 19, 2017, Denis Lebel resigned from the House of Commons, leaving his seat in Lac-Saint-Jean, Québec, vacant.
